Course Description

This course concerns the interaction of social groups in our society. It is designed to give students knowledge of the various social relationships, behavioral patterns, social progresses, and social systems that are included in their culture.

District Standards and Power Benchmarks

Standard:

- Students investigate the development of society and the influence of history, geography, government, human behavior, and economics on individuals and cultures.

- Students investigate how differing perspectives explain the world and society through an understanding of sociological research methods.

- Students will evaluate various forms of inequality and how they impact society.
- Students will analyze the functions of Social Institutions in socializing the individual.
- Students investigate causes and impact of social change on society.
