**Course Description**

This is a one or two term course designed to benefit junior and senior students, especially those who may enter medicine, law or the humanities by providing them with a general and technical vocabulary that will encourage and aid them building advanced English vocabulary. Greek and Latin word parts are studied with the goal of applying their etymological value to new English Vocabulary. Some classical structure is studied with emphasis given to Latin translation.

**Course Information**

This is a one or two term elective course for which students earn .5 credit or 1 credit respectively. Prior study of French, Spanish, or German is helpful.

### **Course Outline/Calendar**

The course covers chapters 1 – 10 in Lingua Latina and Chapters 1 – 8 in ASMSCO Vocabulary for the College Bound Student. Assignments include word study in the library and class, quizzes, tests, readings, homework assignments from both texts and final exams.

Students must maintain a notebook for this class.

### **Instructional Procedures & Support**

Daily class discussion on the most common Latin expressions in our language, legal Latin expressions, Latin prefixes, suffixes, and numerals grafted into English, Greek prefixes, suffixes and some healing arts terms from Greek. Students also learn to read and translate Latin I text. One day per week students will spend an hour in the library reading worthwhile magazines and journals noting new words for further classroom investigation and testing.

### **Classroom Management Procedures**

Students are expected to actively participate in classroom discussion and prepare outside homework assignments on a daily basis. They are also expected to keep a well organized notebook.

### **Assessment Plan**

Grades are sent home at mid-term and the end of the term. Parent/teacher conferences are held each term. Grade is determined by notebook management, quizzes, tests, homework and participation.
