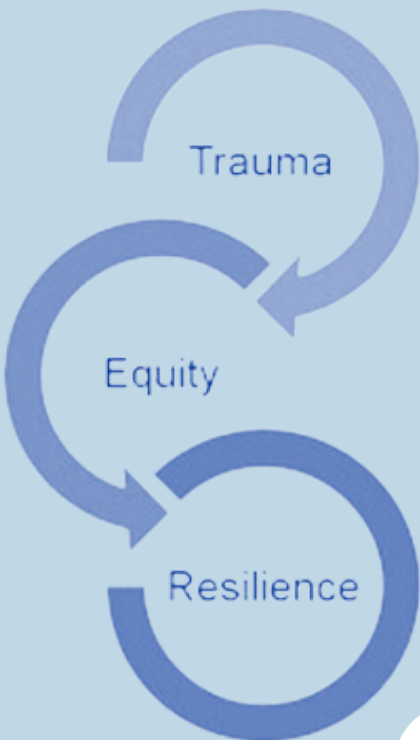


Quad Cities Trauma Informed Consortium Equity Speaker's Bureau 23-24



Often, when we hear the word “trauma” our first thought is a traumatic event, such as a car accident or assault, or one of the 10 Adverse Childhood Experiences (ACEs).

In actuality, trauma encompasses much more than just these two things. Although it may be easier to recognize, prevent and treat ACEs, our current understanding of trauma requires us to dig deeper.

Creating healing communities requires us to move beyond “household” trauma to recognize the systems that have created and perpetuated these issues. We need to work together to understand and combat the environmental and community based challenges that have created the social context for individual trauma.

The Quad City Trauma Informed Consortium is committed to broadening the community conversation about these issues through the Equity Speaker’s Bureau.

Forensic Interviewing

The Child Protection Response Center provides services that aid in the investigation and treatment of victims of child maltreatment. Child maltreatment can have a detrimental impact on the mental health of victims and their families. CPRC strives to minimize additional trauma during the investigation by promoting coordination and teamwork between agencies and using a trauma-informed approach to the services and supports they provide. Christina will give a general overview of a child maltreatment investigation and how trauma-sensitive strategies are implemented to improve outcomes for both the child victims and their families.
